- After Kitten shots vaccine booster every year
- > Flea/Heartworm/Tick Preventive: Once a month
- > Deworming every 6 to 12 months depending on life style.
- Routine Dental care
- > Routine Ear care

- ✓ Kitten food until 9 months of age.
- ✓ May Start Adult food along with kitten food from 9 months.
- ✓ After 1 year of age, adult food only.

Note: Please inquire at front desk to get 30 days of free insurance.

FVRCP: Feline Viral Rhinotracheitis (Feline Distemper), Calicivirus, Panleukopenia

Why this vaccine is important:

- Feline distemper can result in chronic, recurrent nasal and ocular disease
- Calicivirus can cause respiratory issues and chronic gingivitis
- Panleukopenia can cause severe diarrhea and vomiting, as well as often being fatal to kittens

Rabies:

Why this vaccine is important:

Rabies is almost 100% fatal in pets and humans
Most cities have legal requirements for rabies vaccinations.

Felive Leukemia:

Why this vaccine is important:

 Feline Leukemia is a serious, commonly fatal disease which is not a zoonotic disease (not transmitted directly from infected animals to humans). Transmission is via direct contact with an infected cat through activities like mutual grooming, fighting and sharing bowls and litter boxes

Low Risk:

- Indoor only
- No exposure to ANY other cat

High Risk:

- Juvenile pets
- Any time outdoors, even supervised
- Any exposure to other cats that go outdoors, neighbors' cat, foster cats
- Multi-cat households
